Dear Friends,

I have now been employed for a couple of months as the URC minister for Wrington, Winscombe and Nailsea. It has been amazing to return to work in these beautiful villages and towns, as we lived and worked in Wrington for over twenty years, frequently visiting Winscombe and Nailsea.

Nailsea United Reformed Chapel continues to be well led by the present six elders and it is very encouraging to see the commitment of so many of the congregation to ensuring church services continue weekly, getting involved in the community-particularly in supporting the elderly and lonely- and serving God. As Jesus once said in response to being questioned on what were the greatest commandments, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. 'This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.'"

For church life, September is generally considered the beginning of a new year. Similarly, in Israel traditionally, Jews celebrate two New Years: one in the autumn, Tishri, considered to be the civil or secular year start and then in Spring, Nisan, which is accepted as the start of the spiritual year. So, as the Church and the Jews live by two New Years, two beginnings, so does each individual Christian as they have two birthdays or beginnings to celebrate-the first is their natural date of birth, the second their supernatural birth.

Each day, believers are given the choice of whether to live in the old calendar or the new, in the old identity or the new. The right choice is to live every moment in the new supernatural life. As Jesus told Nicodemus, the Jewish religious leader who had come to Him with questions: "You must be born again." He continued: "Truly, truly, I say to you, unless a person is born of water and the Spirit, they cannot enter the kingdom of God." '
