Dear Friends,

“... the angel said to her, *“Do not be afraid, Mary; you have found favour with God. You will conceive and give birth to a son, and you are to call him Jesus. He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High. The Lord God will give him the throne of his father David, and he will reign over Jacob’s descendants forever; his kingdom will never end.”* - Friends, these words from the first Chapter of Luke’s Gospel are followed by a description of how Jesus will be called ‘Son of the Most High’, and how he will be given the throne of his ancestor David and reign over the descendants of Jacob forever; “and of his kingdom there shall be no end”.

During this coming month we will spend a lot of time preparing for the celebration of Christmas. Often this focuses on the coming of the Christ-child, the baby born in a stable and laid in a manger with domestic animals around. This romantic Nativity scene often appears on Christmas cards and in nativity arrangements with lovely figurines for our churches and homes. Which is a good thing and helps us focus on the Biblical account on Jesus’ birth. The alternative is “seasons greetings”, Santa Claus caught up in the Christmas tradition.

However, if we commit ourselves to exploring the Bible accounts, we rediscover the details, such as the titles of the coming Messiah: Wonderful Counselor, Prince of Peace, Son of the Most High, just to mention some. The angel’s message to Mary was not “just” about her “unplanned (unexplainable) pregnancy”, but also about the kingship of Jesus Christ, his coming to rule over the nations, the fact that he was and is the Son of the Most High – “and of his kingdom there shall be no end”.

As we look at the world, in which we live, do we not long for the coming of Christ to rule the nations of the earth? What sort of world would it be, if Jesus Christ ruled in every heart? Wars would cease; there would be an “equal sharing of the things that earth affords”, there would be true justice and lasting peace in the world. God’s kingdom would be here among us. This pandemic still might happen, but there would be no “vaccine war”, either. So, through “equal sharing” we would be a step closer to “taming this beast”. - If only the

peoples of the earth would listen to the angel’s message!

But we should not give up hope in despair. The Angel does not say “If everyone believes...” then these things will happen. Jesus has come into the world and will come again to rule the nations, whether the nations like it or not! His kingdom will have no end, whether we like it or not!

Let us spend this Advent preparing for the coming of Jesus - Son of the Most High, the one who has the throne of his ancestor David, the one who will reign over the descendants of Jacob, the one whose kingdom will have no end – and let us pray that we, and all people, will be ready to welcome him!

Communion Offering for December

Wellspring provides affordable professional counselling for adults in North Somerset as well as donation-based counselling and low-intensity Cognitive Behavioural Therapy (CBT) for young people age 11-18.

The charity was established in 1994 by local church leaders and GPs to provide confidential help and support to people in the local community. We offer our services to all who seek help regardless of gender, ethnic origin or religious beliefs.

Many of the CBT sessions for young people take place in local secondary schools thanks to a grant from The National Lottery.

Clients all self-refer to Wellspring, often after being advised to come by their GP.

Wellspring currently has no statutory funding but receives grants and donations from many local town and parish councils in North Somerset as well as local churches, other groups, trusts, individuals and through fundraising events.

Wellspring Counselling is an organisational member of the British Association for Counselling and Psychotherapy (BACP) and abides by its Ethical Framework for Good Practice in Counselling and Psychotherapy.

Wellspring is governed by a board of trustees. Currently, they have eight trustees who provide experience and expertise in a wide range of business and professional capacities.

Wellspring is a charity underpinned by a Christian ethos, which exists to provide affordable, professional and accessible counselling for the whole community.

Only this time the voice was very insistent, telling my sister that she must stay in her parents' room and she must not let her Mum take her back to bed. My sister refused to be taken back to her room and kicked up a fuss, so Mum and Dad let her into their bed. In the middle of the night there was such a crash; the ceiling of my sister's room had fallen down on top of my sister's bed, but she was safe with Mum and Dad.

Was it an angel's voice? Was an angel watching out for her? My sister died three years ago aged 79 but she was always convinced an angel had spoken to her.
