Dear Friends,

let us love one another, for love comes from God. Everyone who loves has been born of God and knows God. (1John 4:7)

When I was thinking of a theme for this opening letter Valentine's Day came to my mind (which is on 14th February) with the above Bible verse. While it is considered primarily a romantic day by many, we are aware of its "not so romantic" historical and church roots. The Roman Emperor Claudius II needed soldiers. He suspected that marriage made men want to stay at home instead of fighting wars, so he outlawed marriage. A kind-hearted young priest named Valentine felt sorry for all the couples who wanted to marry, but couldn't. So secretly he married as many couples as he could – until the Emperor found out and condemned him to death. While he was in prison awaiting execution, Valentine showed love and compassion to everyone around him, including his jailer. The jailer had a young daughter who was blind, but through Valentine's prayers, she was healed. Just before his death in Rome on 14 February 269 AD, he wrote her a farewell message signed 'From your Valentine.' So the very first Valentine card was not between lovers, but between a priest about to die, and a little girl, healed through his prayers." That's the kind of self-sacrificial love that lasts for life and beyond.

Another aspect of love, and it could be applied to romantic relationships too, is similarly selfless to how it started. It is when we show sincerity in our love towards others. "Above all, show sincere love to each other, because love brings about the forgiveness of many sins." 1 Peter 4:8. In our society real sincerity is often undervalued in everyday relationships.

'A speaker held up a blank sheet of paper and asked, "What do you see?" The reply was, "A piece of paper."

He then placed the paper on the podium, made a tiny dot in the centre and held it up again. "What do you see now?" "A dot," was the unanimous reply from the audience.

"Imagine this blank paper is a person," the speaker said. "The small dot you saw is his/her biggest fault. The white surrounding the dot represents all of this person's worthwhile qualities which we so easily fail to see. Often a fault seems bigger than it really is and we allow it to overshadow the many positive aspects of that person's personality."

In our relationships what do we see in the other: the white piece of paper, or the tiny black dot?
