Dear Friends,

You may have experienced the challenge recently of roof tiles on your home falling off due to the high winds we have experienced, or fence panels become uprooted. The power of the wind is amazing! I recall walking on the Brecon Beacons in my youth and as I reached near to the summit of Pen y Fan, the highest point in that area, it was so windy that I couldn't stand up: I had to crawl to the ordnance survey marker!

We have had some windy days recently and this has brought to mind the double meaning of 'Ruach' in the Bible. This word not only means wind, but also Spirit. In Hebrew the Holy Spirit is the Holy Wind. As I found in my mountain scrambles, it is very hard to walk against the wind and it is tiring and exhausting to walk against the direction the Holy Spirit is wanting to take you. In our Bible study group recently, we discussed Jonah and he is the classic example of someone who tried and look what happened to him!

You may recall the words of Jesus to Nicodemus, recorded in the third chapter of John's gospel: "Very truly I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God unless they are born of water and the Spirit. Flesh gives birth to flesh, but the Spirit gives birth to spirit. You should not be surprised at my saying, 'You must be born again.' The wind blows wherever it pleases. You hear its sound, but you cannot tell where it comes from or where it is going. So, it is with everyone born of the Spirit."

You may well be asking yourself the perfectly valid question: "How do I know when I am doing things in agreement with the Holy Spirit?" The Holy Spirit always blows in the direction of the Holy, the pure, the sacred. If you are attempting to commit yourself to unholy thoughts or actions, then you will be

competing against the Holy Spirit's work in your life. Once you repent and turn around then your life becomes so much easier, because you have the power and strength of the Holy Spirit behind you. When you walk in the Spirit, life changes from being a drag to becoming a breeze!

St Peter's Hospice

St Peter's Hospice provides specialist palliative care to adults in the wider Bristol area with lifelimiting illnesses, including support to their relatives, friends and professional carers. All Hospice services are free of charge to everyone.



At David's Welcome Service the three churches of Wrington, Winscombe and Nailsea were asked to give a brief history of their 'journey'. This was Nailsea's contribution.

Work on building our church in Nailsea began in 1838 to serve the ever growing number of workers in the mining and glassworks industries. First it was an Independent Chapel, then Zion Congregational Church and now Nailsea United Reformed Church.

Numbers have waxed and waned, at one point being as low as 8 and it was suggested then that we should close. But one very determined lady, a Mrs Freda Vowles, refused point blank to allow this to happen and, with the occasional help of itinerant preachers, held services for those loyal few in the vestry. Many of the older folk in Nailsea will still refer to us as 'Freda's Church'.

We became a joint pastorate with Clevedon in 1976 although a joint pastorate minister was not called until the following year . Unfortunately for us Clevedon decided to close and so we lost our minister, Rev Ian Kirby, as his stipend would have been halved. We then joined with Portishead when we were led by Rev Chris Serle. Chris was not a well man and when he died we were again declared vacant and Portishead decided to go it alone'.

Most recently we were joined with Horfield and Argyle Morley in Bristol led by Rev John Gray. This came to an end last year. We now consider ourselves very fortunate in not having had to once again declare a vacancy in the normal way. We are thrilled to be joining with Wrington and Winscombe with David Jewell as our joint minister. We are excited to join with a pastorate where we feel that the emphasis is on caring and sharing and working together as a true and equal joint pastorate

Our secretary, Sally Edmindson, is not well and so cannot be here today, but said to be sure to say that:- David is the 'Jewell' in our crown, a pastoral gift for our congregation. He is an answer to our

prayers, his Bible knowledge and prayer guidance means so much to us all.

We feel that the strength of any church is not only tested by the numbers worshipping but by the depth of loving care that is shown within it. We have had constant cause through all the years of our history to thank God for the warmth of fellowship and depth of concern for each other experienced among those worshipping with us.

We look forward with eagerness to whatever our future holds.
