Dear Friends,

I have been listening to a remarkable series of Podcasts titled: 'The surprising rebirth of belief in God'. It is presented by Justin Brierley, experienced in chairing debates between atheists and Christians. He feels that the tide against faith has turned and that we are beginning to see people generally becoming more tolerant and even interested in what faith could mean for them. The key figure behind hardcore Evangelistic Atheism, Richard Dawkins, has even gone so far as to call himself a 'cultural Christian' which he defines as having no belief in God but appreciative of hymns and churches and of the Christian influence on society. Another central figure in the Atheist movement, Ayaan Hirsi Ali, has recently converted to Christianity. In her childhood in Somalia she had been a Muslim.

It feels to me like it is time for us who have been Christians for many years to remind ourselves of our first love and get serious again about who it is we serve and what the privileges, joys, and challenges there are in being a Jesus follower for much of our lives. We can find ourselves as the Older Brother in the Parable of the prodigal son or one of the outraged workers in the vineyard who had worked all day for the same reward as those who had been called late to the task.

In the course of my work, I find myself talking to those who are mature in years but are spiritual toddlers, relatively new to the faith, and they yearn to have had a much longer walk of faith with their Lord. I say about getting serious not just because of this, but also the sense that the tide is turning, there is a desperate need generally to find meaning and joy in life and some of those searching to have their hearts filled are turning to church. What will they find there? The world around has moved on apace and many have lifestyles which are accepted by society, but whom church fellowships might struggle. I am currently running an Alpha course in one of the churches and two who have attended have said that they separately spent a year visiting empty churches in order to experience the sense of holiness and warmth in them!

So, there is an urgent need to build momentum so that we are ready and then God will encourage attendance in those He can be confident will receive a warm welcome without prejudice, without us wanting to sort their lives out, just leaving all to the Holy Spirit.

GOD'S WISE PURPOSES

Psalm 13 v 1

The United Kingdom brims with history. Many towns and cities have plaques honouring historic figures or commemorating sites where important events occurred. But one such sign exemplifies the droll British sense of humour. On a weathered plaque outside a bed and breakfast in Sandwich, England, a message reads, "On this site, 5 September 1782, nothing happened."

Sometimes it seems to us that nothing is happening regarding our prayers. We pray and pray, bringing our petitions to our Father with expectation that He'll respond - right now. The psalmist David expressed such frustration when he prayed, "How long, Lord? Will you forget me forever? How long will you hide your face from me?" (Psalm 13:1).We can easily echo those same thoughts: How long, Lord, before you respond? However, our God is not only perfect in His wisdom but also in His timing. David was able to say, "I trust in your unfailing love; my heart rejoices in your salvation" (v5). Ecclesiastes 3:11 reminds us "(God) has made everything beautiful in its time." God may not always respond to our prayers when we'd like Him to, but He's always working out His wise purposes. We can take heart that when He does answer, it will be right and good and beautiful.

Loving God, please help me to learn a patience in prayer born of trust in You.
