Understanding the Bible

How important is the Bible? It's so vital that people in many countries risk their lives to translate it into their native languages. Often, these are ordinary believers in Jesus who face arrest for translating the words of Scripture into a heart language others can understand.

One female translator from a country hostile to believers in Jesus said,"I must complete this work.I want to see my beloved ones experience salvation in Christ." And a man who organises persecuted Christians to secretly translate Scripture explains that the Bible is essential to growing mature believers in local churches: "You can start a church, but (without) the Bible in its heart language, it will typically only last one generation."

Why are they doing this? Because there's no other book like the Bible. Its preservation through the centuries is unique. Its authenticity and its representation of the human heart is accurate. It's "alive and active....(and) judges the thoughts and attitudes of the heart." (Hebrews 4:12). And "all Scripture is God-breathed" (2 Timothy 3:16), inspired by Him. And most important, it reveals the source and reality of "salvation through faith in Christ Jesus" (v.15).

Let's read, cherish and live by the Scriptures. And as God provides, let's help those around the world receive it and understand it.

Nailsea Climate Cafe


After our August break we are opening our doors again to local people living in Nailsea and surrounding areas - from those deeply concerned to those just curious to know more about the climate crisis we are facing.

Inside the Walls

It is said that during the Second World War some soldiers serving in France wanted to bury a friend and fellow soldier who had been killed. Being in a foreign country they wanted to ensure their fallen comrade had a proper burial. They found a well-kept cemetery with a low stone wall around it, a picturesque little Catholic church and a peaceful outlook. This was just the place to bury their friend. But when they approached the priest he answered that unless their friend was a baptised Catholic, which he wasn't, he could not be buried in the cemetery.

Sensing the soldiers disappointment the priest showed them a spot outside the walls where they could bury their friend. Reluctantly they did so.

The next day the soldiers returned to pay their final respects to their fallen friend but could not find the grave. "Surely we can't be mistaken. It was right here!" they said. Confused, they approached the priest who took them to a spot inside the cemetery walls. "Last night I couldn't sleep" said the priest. "I was troubled that your friend had to be buried outside the cemetery walls, so I got up and moved the wall."
